

Ferdinand Bauer (1760-1826) went as an artist of natural history on the coastal survey of New Holland, under the command of Captain Flinders of the HMS *Investigator*. Robert Brown was the naturalist on this expedition, and

both he and Bauer went on the recommendation and at the expense of Sir Joseph Banks. In 1803, after the Investigator was condemned as unseaworthy, Captain Flinders decided to return to England to obtain another ship to complete the expedition. Bauer and Brown, however, continued their travels in Australia, and finally returned to England in 1805 with several thousands of botanical specimens and many hundreds of sketches of plants. In 18[06] Bauer began to publish his Illustrationes florae Novae Hollandiae, a work which did not meet with sufficient encouragement to be continued after the third number' (Henrey 2:195). Ferdinand Bauer's elder brother, Franz Andreas, later explained that the project was abandoned due to Ferdinand's inability to find competent engravers and colourists to complete it, forcing Ferdinand's return to his native Austria. According to Stafleu, fewer than fifty copies were published.

With the support of Isaac Rand, Blackwell drew, engraved, and coloured the illustrations herself, using specimens from the Chelsea Physic Garden. The work, which was originally issued in weekly parts between 1737 and 1739 in London,

was a great success, and afforded Alexander his freedom. However, Alexander left his family for Sweden in 1742, where he was appointed court physician to the Swedish king (despite his complete lack of formal medical training). The young "doctor" was hanged for treason in 1748 for his involvement in a political conspiracy over the royal line of succession. By the time of the publication of the present work Elizabeth, a widow, was apparently denied any profits from the enterprise.





"In 1909 Wollaston joined the expedition to Dutch New Guinea organized by the British Ornithologists' Union under Walter Goodfellow. The expedition failed to reach the Nassau range, and there was much sickness; but Wollaston made a valuable collection of natural history specimens and an interesting study of the Tapiro tribe, discovered by the expedition and described in his Pygmies and Papuans (1912)" (ODNB).

The French physician, lawyer, and naturalist Pierre-Joseph Buc'hoz (1731-1807) published a prolific output of over 500 works, though copies of this work are rare at auction. Herbier ou collection des plantes médicinales de la Chine includes 300 plants which are now familiar, though many of them were unknown to eighteenth-century Europeans.

Blunt notes that the "early plates were actually painted in China", hence placing this work amongst a small number of books where "considerable use is made for the first time of drawings of Chinese plants executed by native artists" (*Great Flower Books*, p. 52). The work was issued without text, but this copy includes the "Explication des Planches" leaf.

Buffon (1707-1788) was one of the pre-eminent naturalists in France at the time, and his *Histoire naturelle* was a groundbreaking success, apparently read "...by every educated person in Europe" (Mayr, Ernst 1981. *The Growth of Biological Thought*. This later edition was subject to improvements made by Bernard Germain de Lacépède (1756-1825), who continued the encyclopedia after the comte de Buffon's death.

America. Bury's work was conceived as a companion to William Roscoe's Monandrian Plants. Priscilla Bury (1799-1872), was the daughter of Edward Dean Falkner (1750-1825), a wealthy Liverpool trader, who had been high sheriff of Lancashire in 1788, and his wife, Bridgett Tarleton (d. 1819), only daughter of John Tarleton a merchant and shipowner. She lived at Fairfield, two miles east of Liverpool, where she painted plants raised in the greenhouses there. John Tarleton was the brother of Colonel Tarleton (1754-1833), whose portrait by Reynolds resides in the National Gallery. Audubon was one of the subscribers to this large folio.

Renowned for being Redouté's first major work as an illustrator, this was also the first major botanical work to rely on colour-printed plates. The project was initiated by Charles-Louis l'Heritier de Brutelle (1746-1800). When Redouté began work on the drawings, the young Swiss

botanist Augustin Pyramus de Candolle was drafted to write the descriptions of each species. The original edition was published in 28 fascicles between 1799 and 1805 containing 180 plates, at which point publication stopped. Guillemin resumed the work in a quarto edition with another three fascicles containing 19 plates. There is tremendous variation in the contents of different copies. Stafleu & Cowan write: "there are hardly any identical copies. Very often plates are lacking, but...a huge number of 'variants' exist."

The first edition was published in Antwerp by Jacques van Meurs in 1657 under the title *La methode et invention nouvelle de dresser les chevaux* while the author was in

exile. Volume 1 is an English translation of Newcastle's work; volume 2 is a translation of *La parfaite connoissance* des chevaux by Jean de Saunier. The engraved title in the present copy contains the original engraved title in French.

At Antwerp Newcastle set up a manege where he trained eight Barbary horses he had purchased in Paris. The *Methode et invention* contained Newcastle's exposition of the theory and practice of the art of manage and its illustrations by Diepenbeke are remarkable not only for their excellence, but for the number of portraits they contain. Numerous diagrams represent Newcastle training horses in his riding school and in the double-page plates he is depicted performing various feats of horsemanship before Welbeck. Bolsover or some other of his houses.

A sumptuous collection of mounted watercolours depicting Chinese silkworm cultivation, parrots and other birds, Asian fruits and multivarious species of flowers; the work of exceptionally fine draughtsmanship from a Chinese school. Stylistic variety suggests a number of hands. The Chinese characters on the painting of silkworms read 全源號繭箔 (Quan Yuan Hao Jian Bo), meaning a shop (the first three characters) that sells silk foil (the last two characters). The spines of two volumes are labelled "Flowers", and the third is labelled "Silk Worms, Fruits &c".

George Spencer, the fifth Duke of Marlborough (1766-1840), was previously the Marquess of Blandford, having received the title in 1798. The armorial design on the

covers of this book exhibit the coronet of a marquess. When he became Duke of Marlborough in 1817, he updated his armorial to exhibit a ducal coronet. He had a famed library at Whiteknights Park, near Reading. In 1819, his library was sold due to financial difficulties exacerbated by his extravagant lifestyle (7 and 22 June 1819). At Whiteknights the Duke had established the gardens as some of the most renowned in England at the time, richly described by Barbara Hofland in A Descriptive Account of the Mansion and Gardens of White-Knights, 1819. They featured a folly of a ruined Gothic chapel, exotic botanicals imported from China and India and a Chinese temple. He was a passionate botanist, and much of his library reflected this love for natural history, this rare collection of watercolours being no exception.

Following the Macartney Embassy in 1793, China opened up to the West, meaning the drawings could have been produced in the late eighteenth to the very beginning of the nineteenth century.

A rich multi-volume collection of exceptionally fine Chinese watercolours. With an outstanding variety in subject matter, the collection exhibits flowers in two volumes (78), natural history in two volumes (61), professions and customs in three volumes (130), punishments (23) and

junks (46). The watercolours exhibit the work of a number of different highly skilled hands. Chinese naval scenes are delicately rendered, along with gruesome depictions of the Chinese penal code, male and female jobs and duties, and Asian fruits, flowers and wildlife. The natural history watercolours exhibit Indian influence in style and subject. The mango, native to India, is presented, along with ornithological subjects in a Northern Indian style.

Daniel's Rural Sports, which proved extremely popular among contemporary sportsmen and naturalists and contains a series of impressive plates, was first published in two volumes in 1801. To this 1807 edition has been added the supplementary volume published in 1813. William Barker Daniel (1754-1833) was a clergyman and one of the earliest writers on English rural sports, from a time before the introduction of modern guns. The present work contains one of the earliest authentic accounts of wild-fowl shooting with punt and gun. Though ordained as a deacon at Lincoln in December 1785 and as a priest at Gloucester on 12 March 1786, Daniel was never beneficed, and shocked his contemporaries by his devotion to sport in general. In 1788 he was appointed private chaplain to the prince regent, a position he is believed to have retained until retirement.

Xavier della Gatta, or sometimes called Saverio della Gatta, was a Neapolitan painter active in the 18th and early part of the 19th century. He is recorded as having studied under the tutelage of Jacopo Cestaro in 1777 at the

drawing academy in Naples. He is best known for gouache paintings of Naples; its terrain, people and culture. Della Gatta worked for both the court and for the visiting tourists. In 1782 he was commissioned by the King of Naples to produce costume designs depicting the different dress and attire of the various provinces.

This group demonstrates both Della Gatta's ability to capture the Neapolitan people and his mastery of the medium of gouache, creating images that are bursting with colour and vibrancy and leaving no doubt as to why he was such a popular artist for tourists on the Grand Tour.

The engraved frontispiece shows a meeting of the Academy in the Royal Library at Versailles, with Louis XIV and Colbert present. It is the first illustration of the meeting of any learned society.

This volume was a prospectus for the great *Histoire des plantes*, which was never formally published.

An impressive set of the records of the voyage of the *Astrolabe*, recounting scientific and cartographical research across varied subject areas, with engraved illustrations and tables. The famous circumnavigation by the *Astrolabe* was captained by Jules Dumont d'Urville (1790–1842), a naval officer with a keen interest in botany and cartography, who encouraged the scientific research of the natural world of the Pacific.

d'Urville was a timid young man, having had a difficult childhood. He failed his school entrance exams and entered the navy, excelling due to his diligence and dedication. He became an impressive linguist, learning not only classical and Europeans languages but Pacific dialects as well, educating himself at the same time in botany and entomology. On his first expedition, a hydrographic survey of the Greek Mediterranean, he was involved in the discovery of the Venus de Milo, a Hellenistic marble statue dating from the 2nd century B.C.E., procuring the statue for the Louvre, which earned him the title of Lieutenant. On the voyage of the Coquille, Dumont discovered the Adélie penguin, and brought back to France an impressive collection of specimens, giving his name to numerous varieties of seaweed from the waters around New Zealand. He embarked on a circumnavigation of the globe aboard the Astrolabe, mapping areas of the Pacific for the first time, and performing essential botanical and scientific research: the present volume, his record of this journey, was written on his return, funded by the French government. However, he was obsessed by embarking on a third Pacific voyage. This led to his Antarctic expedition which was was a journey marred with numerous difficulties, simultaneous with personal losses, and the deterioration of Dumont's own health. He died in a train accident in 1842, leaving behind an unequalled legacy of Pacific exploration.



"The first coloured illustrations of birds in a book which attempted to list and portray all of the British species, many of them life-size... Peter Paillou contributed most of the designs and coloured the prints, the colour being extended to the trees, branches and foregrounds" (Jackson). Inserted in this copy is an autograph letter, dated January 13 1747, regarding the translation of the *History of Birds* and presenting this copy to the Duchess of Richmond, probably Lady Sarah Lennox, wife of Charles, the 2nd Duke of Richmond:

"I have considered that the translation of my second part of History of birds without the first is but an imperfect thing therefore in Consideration of your graces generosety [sic] I must beg the favour that you will be pleased to accept this first part of the French translation *gratis* in Order to make the Book perfect".

The Duke and Duchess of Richmond gave lifelong support to George Edwards, who first encountered them through Sir Hans Sloane, Edwards' work A Natural History of Birds first catapulted him into fame for his ornithological drawings, and led to Sloane having Edwards appointed as bedell at the Royal College of Physicians in 1733. The Duke would send stuffed and live birds to Edwards for him to draw. Histoire Naturelle de Divers Oiseaux was dedicated to the the 2nd Duke of Richmond, and the second volume (1748) was dedicated to the Duchess, "showing that, through the descent from Louise de Keroualle, they were still very much thought of as leading Francophiles" (R. Baird. Goodwood: Art and Architecture, Sport and Family, 2007, pp. 70-71). Edwards' close relationship with the Duke and Duchess led to his appointment to a fellowship of the Royal Society in 1744.





John Gerarde's *Herball*, originally published in 1597, would become a standard botanical text in seventeenth century England. It is in large part a plagiarised English translation of a 1554 herbal by Rembert Dodoens, and contains woodcuts derived from numerous Continental sources.

Gerarde was an experienced practical botanist who cultivated rare plants at his garden in Holborn, including exotic species from the New World. He also supervised the gardens of noblemen including William Cecil, 1st Baron Burghley and was curator of the physic garden of the Royal College of Physicians.

However, the *Herball* contains folkloric and mythical elements as well as a number of misconceptions and mistakes which betray his lack of scientific training. The second and third editions (1633 and 1636) were edited by Thomas Johnson (d.1644), lauded by the Oxonian antiquary Anthony Wood as "the best herbalist of his age in England". Johnson's editions contain more than 800 new species and 700 new figures, as well as numerous corrections, showing how far the field of botanical knowledge had advanced between the late Elizabethan era and the 1630s.







Originally published in eight parts, this work has now become quite scarce. Horsfield served under the Dutch in Java and Sumatra in 1799 and, when the English took temporary possession of the Malayan colonies in 1811, he transferred his services to the British. He was dispatched by Sir Stamford Raffles to the smaller island of Banca to observe its natural history, finally leaving the East Indies in 1819 after nearly twenty years of service. Upon his return,

Horsfield was appointed keeper of the museum of the East India Company in Leadenhall Street; and the present work is dedicated to the Directors of the East India Company, and remains one of the most important descriptions of the zoology of the area.

A MAGNIFICENT SET OF VIENNESE BOTANICAL ILLUSTRATIONS, ARRANGED IN THE LINNAEAN ORDER OF CLASSIFICATION.

The manuscript heading for each genus and species indicates where in Karl Ludwig Willdenow's comprehensive and influential revision of Linnaeus's *Species plantarum* (Berlin, 1797-1805) each plant appears. Willdenow revised some of Linnaeus's classifications and the contents leaves note these changes. The Linnaean class numbers are labelled on the spines, as follows: 3.2; 5.1; 5.2; 5.4; 7-8-9; 10.1; 11; 14.2; 16.1; 16.2; 17.1; 19.1; 19.2; 19.3; 21.1;

21.12; 24.2. The final volume in this set contains fungi, though without any Willdenow references as his revision of Linnaeus was not completed.

The fine watercolour drawings all contain the details of their sources, with the name of the original artist in the lower left corner and the printed source in the lower right hand corner; a few also have manuscript notes on the verso indicating if, for example, the seed pods are not shown. The bulk of the plates are taken from Jacquin's numerous works, in particular Icones plantarum rariores (1781-1793), Florae Austriacae (1773-1778) and Plantarum rariorum Horti Caesarei Schoenbrunnensis (1797-1804), along with Aiton's Hortus Kewensis (1789), Curtis's Botanical Magazine and Flora Londinensis, Oeder's Flora Danica, Scopoli's Deliciae florae et faunae insubricae (1786) and Cavanilles's Monadelphiae classis dissertationes decem (1790). Other significant botanical works are also mentioned, including Besler's Hortus Eystettensis, Rheede tot Drakenstein's Hortus Indicus Malabaricus, Roxburgh and Banks's works on the plants of Coromandel, Waldstein and Kitaibel's Descriptiones et icones plantarum rariorum Hungariae (1802-1812), and Pallas's Flora Rossica.

The paper is all Dutch and datable to the late eighteenthearly nineteenth century, with various watermarks from the makers C&J Honig, J. Kool, J. Villedary and D. & C. Blauw.





Bois (1848-1921), whose family had held a prominent place in the mercantile life of Ceylon since the 1860s.

This beautiful album contains exquisite watercolour drawings of birds perched on trees with foliage and flowers, probably the work of at least four Indo-Chinese artists, together with a series of watercolour drawings of Chinese Junks. A bookseller's note loosely inserted in the preliminary leaves states that the album was given by the Begum of Bengal in about 1780 to Mrs. Elizabeth Sophia Plowden. An ink inscription to the front free endpaper reads "23 pictures of birds | Mrs. Elizabeth Sophia Plowden" (i.e. Mrs. Richard Chichely Plowden). It does not appear that these drawings were initially produced

for presentation. They are not uniform in size, some have marks around the edges, and some appear to have been trimmed down, suggesting that this is a composite album.

Lutfunissa Begum (1740-1790) was the third (but primary) wife of Nawab Siraj ud-Daulah (1733-1757), the last independent Nawab of Bengal. Elizabeth Plowden (née Prosser) was the wife of Richard Chichely Plowden of the Bengal Civil Service, whose papers are now in the National Archive. Elizabeth was resident in India between 1777 and 1790, during which time she achieved some success "collecting and performing the Persian and Hindustani songs of *nautch* performers at the Lucknow court". She wrote down these songs in European notation and turned them into published arrangements for the harpsichord which became "all the rage in drawing rooms across the British Empire" (British Library, 2018).



VERY RARE.

The beauty and reputation of *Icones Plantarum Rariorum* is founded on the engravings by the brothers Bauer. Jacquin was the first botanist to recognize the talent of Franz and Ferdinand and engaged them both for this project. "From Jacquin or [Father Norbert] Boccius or both they learned that botanical draughtsmanship demands understanding of the plant figured, even down to minute detail, as well as its portrayal with accuracy and grace...Under such supervision they became accustomed to precise

observation and developed superb techniques of drawing and colouring. Jacquin himself was an able botanical artist but his teaching and administrative duties gave him no time for illustrating plants except in correspondence with Sir Joseph Banks's librarian Jonas Dryander" (Stewart & Stearn, *The Orchid Paintings of Franz Bauer*, London 1993, p. 9). After the Bauers perfected their skills under Jacquin, Ferdinand worked on the *Flora Graeca* under John Sibthorp, and Franz was enticed by Sir Joseph Banks to become the resident artist at Kew Gardens. The plates were issued—without regard to the order later assigned to them—in fascicles of 25, apart from the final part issued in 1795, which contained 74 engravings.

The present edition is the only publication listed in Nissen for Oxalis (wood sorrel), and thus is significant for the history of botany.



In the early 1780s L'Heritier de Brutelle, a wealthy French nobleman and botanist (and a "die-hard Linnaean", according to Blunt & Stearn), made the acquaintance of Pierre-Joseph Redouté, then in his early twenties, and immediately recognized that the young painter's great talents were particularly suited for botanical representation. L'Heritier thus became one of Redoute's most ardent supporters and patrons, giving him the run of his splendid library and collection of specimens and instructing him in plant anatomy and the techniques of botanical dissection.

The *Cornus*, "a magnificent eighteenth-century monograph on the Dogwoods, with three fine plates by Redouté and three good ones by Freret" (McGill/Hunt) was the first of L'Heritier's collaborative efforts with Redouté.

In 1786, L'Heritier visited England, where Redouté joined him. The Sertum anglicum or "English garland", a description of the rare exotics growing at Kew Garden, was offered by L'Heritier to Sir Joseph Banks and his other English friends, in gratitude for their help and hospitality during his visit. Thirty-seven of the plates contain the first known illustrations of their respective species; these include a number of South African plants, some collected by Francis Masson.

The *Geraniologia* contains some of Redouté's best early work (L'Heritier's text was never finished and of the portion that he had written only a very few copies were printed). "Several of the drawings used in this work were made during L'Heritier's stay in London. If regularly published, it would have been a fitting pendant to the *Sertum Anglicum*" (Stafleu & Cowan).

L'Heritier, a wealthy French nobleman and botanist, published a number of important specimen books in the 1780's, illustrating exotic plants found in Europe. In the process he launched the career of Redouté by publishing his illustrations and by introducing him to the highest levels of Parisian society. In addition he instructed Redouté in plant anatomy, the techniques of dissection, and made his large collection of books and specimens available to the young artist. While L'Heritier advised Redouté in the appropriate details necessary for correct botanical drawings, the Dutch flower painter, Gerrit van Spaendonck, encouraged the young artist's talents by teaching him the techniques for capturing variations in tone and color.

The Sertum Anglicum, or English Garland of Flowers, was an attempt to describe and illustrate some of the rare exotics growing at Kew Garden. When L'Heritier visited London in 1786, Redouté joined him there, and they worked on the volume together (Hunt). Thirty-one of the plates illustrated their respective species for the first time, while seven contain the only known illustration of the species.



The Loddiges nursery was the pre-eminent plant nursery that traded rare and exotic plants from as far as Australia. The invention of the Wardian Case, an early type of terrarium, allowed for plants to be kept healthy and alive on these long voyages. It was known for its arboretum, which had a significant flow of visitors including Charles Darwin and John James Audubon.

Mrs. Loudon's works, which became standard references, helped to make gardening an acceptable activity for suburban women. She was married to John Claudius Loudon, one of the most important nineteenth-century landscape gardeners and horticultural writers. In addition to creating practical gardening guides for amateurs, Mrs. Loudon was a pioneer of what would later be called science fiction. Her novel The Mummy!: Or a Tale of the Twenty-Second Century (1827) predicted a world in which women wore trousers, lawyers and surgeons were replaced by automatons, and information was dispersed by a system similar to the Internet. The novel is considered a feminist classic as well as a precursor of science fiction. Jane Webb met her future husband after he wrote a favorable review of her novel. They became the leading horticulturists of their day and counted Dickens and Thackeray among their friends.

Although just an amateur naturalist, Malherbe's *Monographie* was the first authoritative survey of

woodpeckers, amongst other important ornithological works. It was considered to be "the best monograph on the woodpeckers of the world... [and] finely illustrated by well-drawn, hand-colored plates" (Wood).

Alfred Malherbe (1804-1865) was born in Mauritius but moved to France to work as a magistrate. He was a keen ornitholigst and travelled to Algeria and Sicily to study the birds there. His large collection of birds was partially donated to the Asiatic Society of Bengal in Calcutta as well as being gifted to the Milan natural history museum.

"Storia naturale degli uccelli... was one of the finest bird books issued to that date and one of the most sumptuous publications of the Eighteenth century in Italy" (Christine Jackson, *Dictionary of Bird Artists of the World*). "Impressive, too, was... Manetti's Ornithologia methodice digesta, the flamboyant forerunner of the splendid ornithological folios which were to appear in the nineteenth century. The production of its five massive folio volumes

must have been one of the most remarkable publishing ventures ever undertaken in Florence. Begun in 1767 and completed ten years later, it was larger, better engraved and more vividly colored than any previous book on birds" (S. Peter Dance, *The Art of Natural History*, p. 70).

Saverio Manetti (1723-1785) was an Italian physician and botanist known for his ornithological drawings. From 1749 to 1782 he was the supervisor of the Orto Botanico di Firenze in Florence, and it was during his tenure there that the present monumental work was published. The book was commissioned by Maria Luisa, the Grand duchess of Tuscany. Carl Linnaeus named the plant genus Manettia after him.

A fine copy of the first botanical book to be illustrated with colour-printed plates, a pioneer work that led the way for the Society of Gardeners' Catalogus, Thornton's Temple of Flora, and the great French nineteenth-century colour printing of Redouté and others. The plates were engraved in mezzotint by Elisha Kirkall after paintings by Jacob van Huysum, R. Sartorius, and others. Most of the plates are printed in two colours, some in more. All are printed

in a single pull. The colour-printing produces a blurred effect due to the medium of mezzotint, but this is quite appropriate for hairy-leaved plants, producing a good general impression. The quality of the draughtsmanship is excellent. Each plate is dedicated to a patron-subscriber and has a coat of arms. The dedicatees include scientists, Cambridge colleges, doctors and horticulturalists such as Phillip Miller. The work is devoted to new species growing in the Chelsea Physic Garden and the Cambridge Botanic Garden.

Martyn (1699-1768) was the founder of Britain's first botanical society. The success of this led to his lecturing at Cambridge and election to the Royal Society.

He was a fellow of the Linnean Society from 1827 and served on the botanical committees of the Worcestershire Natural History Society. His magnum opus, The Botanic Garden, was published monthly over an astounding twenty-six year period. Most, if not all, of the original drawings for The Botanic Garden are now in the Natural History Museum in London. Several important artists contributed, including Mrs. Edward Bury, the artist of "Hexandrian Plants"; Miss E. Maund; Miss S. Maund; E.D. Smith and Mills.

Meyer's wife, Mary Anne

Moor, herself an accomplished artist, assisted in engraving the plates and may even have been responsible for some of the original drawings. The work is of notorious bibliographical complexity, investigated in W.G. Hale's monograph, *The Meyers' Coloured Illustrations of British Birds and their Eggs* (London, 2007).

The uncoloured plates invariably included lettering for scientific purposes, while the handcoloured plates are often without lettering and the vast majority are printed using a warm brown ink

with the intent of making the images more aesthetically pleasing. The plants described and illustrated came in the main from Dr. John Fothergill's famous garden in Upton, Essex. Fothergill was an enthusiastic supporter and indeed superintendent of the work, but refused Miller's attempt to dedicate the work to him. He felt that dedications were "more productive of envy to the patron, than of advantage to the author." John Miller (1715–1780), born Johann Sebastian Müller in Nuremberg, came to England in 1744 and remained there for the rest of his life. He was a botanical artist and engraver of considerable repute and came to the attention of the great naturalist Linnæus through the connection of John Ellis. Linnæus had nothing but praise for the artist, stating that the plates were "more beautiful and more accurate" than any he had ever seen.

The illuminating introduction also provides a historical and geographical survey of all the most important botanical works published in Europe and maintains that the hand-colouring of the plates in the present work is more accurate than the colour-printed plates in contemporaneous French botanical publications. The author further asserts that because the text of *Herbier général de l'amateur* is much more discursive, the work is also superior to such English periodicals as William Curtis's *Botanical Magazine*.

Mill-owner Edward Salt had a world-renowned collection of orchids, recorded in these two volumes in sumptuous detail. He kept the plants in a bespoke odontoglossum

house, considered a model of perfection, on his estate at Ferniehurst. Ferniehurst itself was built by Salt in the early 1860s. He married his first wife Mary Jane Susan Elgood on 10 July 1861; and it therefore seems likely that the house was built for her. There are no known pictures of the house and no building plans; however, maps of the area do show the basic plan of the house and of the glasshouses and other buildings. The Salt orchid collection was auctioned in 1892, when the estate was put up for sale as a result of the restructuring of the family firm.

GOOD EXAMPLES OF NINETEENTH CENTURY HORTICULTURAL JOURNALISM.

The early nineteenth century was a time of particular interest in flowering plants, and a variety of publications attempted to catalogue the ever-growing variety of known species.

Paxton's Magazine of Botany, of which this lot includes the 16th (and final) volume only, was an attempt to create a magazine of more important stature, with several important artists contributing to this work. Sir Joseph Paxton (1803-1865) was the head gardener for the Duke of Devonshire, and Chatsworth estate flourished with one of the most famous gardens in Europe under Paxton's cultivating hand. Nowadays, he is best known for originating the Cavendish banana.

Thomas Moore (1821-1887), the curator of the Chelsea Physic Garden, intended the *Gardeners' Magazine of Botany* as a publication for professional gardeners. The publication survived for two years, but closed due to a lack of subscribers. Indeed, the preface to volume 3 acknowledges that the "numbers [of professional gardeners] who seek for Scientific Information and Technical Botany are a limited class". Undeterred, Moore went on to serve as the editor of the *Garden Companion*, *And Florists' Guide*.

EXQUISITE RENDERINGS OF SOUTH AMERICAN FLORA MADE FOR ALEXANDER VON HUMBOLDT AND AIMÉ BONPLAND'S MONUMENTAL SCIENTIFIC SURVEY OF CENTRAL AND SOUTH AMERICA, conducted between 1799 and 1804, notable as the first survey of the region conducted along western scientific principles. These are therefore perhaps the most important drawings of South American flora ever made.

Humboldt's expedition made his name, not least because he published so prolifically and promptly after his return. His reputation grew to the extent that during his lifetime he became one of the most famous men in Europe. Aimé Bonpland (1773–1858), the botanist on the expedition, was a more reticent character, who had to be chivvied into providing the descriptions of the 6,000 plants he collected, most of which were hitherto unknown in Europe.

The reports of the expedition ran to many volumes: *Plantes équinoxiales, recueillies au Mexique*, is the first section of the sixth part, and can be treated as a separate work in its own right. Sabin describes it as "one of the greatest works on American botany ever put forth."

For a work of such importance, two prominent artists were employed to draw the specimens. Pierre Antoine Poiteau (1766-1854) was a French botanist and artist, a pupil of van Spaendonck and follower of Redouté, who spent the early part of his career collecting specimens in the Caribbean. He later served as head gardener at Versailles and head of the Muséum National d'Histoire Naturelle of Paris. He was

a frequent collaborator with Pierre Jean François Turpin (1775–1840), the pair having met in Haiti in the 1790s. Poiteau schooled Turpin in botany and its art, and the latter went on to be considered to be one of the greatest botanical artists of the Napoleonic era. In 1802 or shortly after, following unrest in Haiti that claimed the life of his wife and two children, Turpin fled to America. Here, in Philadelphia, he met Humboldt who commissioned him to make the drawings in these volumes, in collaboration with his old friend Poiteau.

The resulting delicate monochrome drawings represent a high watermark in French scientific illustration, with a precision and artistry which is the peer of any of the best botanical art of the period. The specimens shown were collected in Venezuela, Cuba, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, and Mexico, as well as the Orinoco and Amazon basins, and include palms, orchids, cinchona, mutisia, and numerous species of oak.

The provenance of the collection is fascinating. Both Matthew Lewis senior and junior had property and business interests in the Caribbean, perhaps explaining their ownership of these drawings. While publication of the printed work continued until 1817, it is possible that the drawings had been completed and engraved earlier than this and were acquired by Lewis senior, or perhaps Lewis junior acquired them and affixed the family bookplate.

It seems likely that the drawings passed to the Earls Cowper through Monk Lewis's intense friendship with William Lamb, 2nd Viscount Melbourne (1779–1848), whose sister Emily (1787–1869) married the 5th Earl Cowper in 1805. Lamb's seat, Brocket Hall, came to the Earls Cowper following Emily's death, but a large part of the collection there was relocated to Panshanger, Hertfordshire (now demolished).



The vast majority of the plates were drawn from life and a significant number are printed in brown. All show the subject plant, with a section of the root and details of flowers and fruits, and underneath each image an identification by its common name in as many European languages as possible. The facing single page of text includes an identification of the plant according to the classification system of Linnæus, Tournefort and Adanson, a botanical description of the plant followed by its uses, then general comments including historical references.

Nicolas Robert (1614-1685) was one of the most outstanding French botanical artists of the seventeenth century. He was commissioned by Louis XIII's brother Gaston d'Orléans to keep a pictorial record of the plants and animals in his gardens at Blois. Afterwards he was chosen as the chief illustrator for the *Histoire des Plantes*, a project by the newly founded Académie Royale des Sciences. Most of his drawings are preserved in the Jardin des Plantes museum in Paris. The British Museum possesses two volumes of

drawings attributed to him and there are other drawings in the Broughton Collection at the Fitzwilliam Museum. Wilfrid Blunt refers to the present drawings as "a pretty, and unquestionably genuine, little florilegium made by Robert at Lyons in 1643" (*The Art of Botanical Illustration*, p. 110).

The remarkable contemporary binding features the owner's name, M.R. Desbois, as well as attributing the Florilegium to Robert with the date. The Desbois family were a notable family in Macon, with Pierre Desbois, the owner of the present work, being elected in 1622. He then became "annobli par une charge de secrétaire du roi" in 1645.





Roscoe was a banker from Liverpool and supporter of the liberal arts. The present work—his masterpiece—was originally issued in 15 parts, and is focused on a selection that is now considered part of the Zingiberales order of flowering plants. The order, which is almost exclusively tropical in origin, includes the canna lilies, arrowroot, ginger

and turmeric. Roscoe provides 1 or 2 pages of text for each specimen, giving the plant's binomial, a technical description, then a fuller, more general description, and ending with "observations" (notes on where the plant is from, who has described it previously, and often when the drawing of the plant was made) and "references" (brief explanations of the small numbered dissections found on each plate).

The characteristic leaf shapes and flower-sprays provide the numerous artists of the work with some spectacular originals to work from. Helpfully, Roscoe identifies all but one of the artists, with the majority of the images having been provided by Thomas Allport. The plates are important relatively early lithographs which are attributed by Roscoe to George Graves, but they are almost certainly "actually printed by Hullmandell, though Graves may have placed the commission for Roscoe" (John Collins writing in the Plesch catalogue). Collins earlier notes that although Graves specialized in coloring natural history plates, he is not known as a lithographer.

John Forbes Royle (1798-1858) was a British botanist, and expert in *materia medica*, based for much of his professional life in British occupied India. He ran the botanical garden at Saharanpur, founded by the East India Company as a means of introducing new plants into their trade economy, during which he specialised in learning the Hindu tradition of botanical remedies, which formed the basis of his publication On the Antiquity of Hindu Medicine (1837). His *Illustrations of the botany... of the Himalayan mountains* was published when he had returned to England, as a professor of *materia medica* at King's College, London.

A "pioneering ecological study" (Rix) on the trees, shrubs and flowers of the Himalayan region of the Indian


sub-continent, illustrated with delightful images after Vishnuperand: "the most talented of the native Indian [botanical] artists" (Blunt). He was employed by many of the most important plant collectors and botanists of the time, including Nathaniel Wallich and Robert Wight, and unfortunately, he remains one of only a handful of early 19th-century Indian botanical artists whose names are known - this in itself is an indication of the high esteem in which his work was held by western botanists at the time. An examination of the large collection of his original drawings still held by the India Office Library and the Kew Herbarium confirms his reputation amongst his contemporaries. The transfer of the drawings onto stone was carried out by the greatest of the early lithographers of botanical subjects: the Maltese born Maxim Gauci, and, unusually, Forbes also gives the names of the colourists: Mr. Clarke (probably John Clark who colored the plates in Wallich's Plantae Asiaticae) and Mr. Barclay.

For his contribution to the field of botany, his surname was used to name the *Amphicarpaea* genus, and a genus of the Phyllanthaceae family, *Savia* and *Heterosavia* respectively.

the Linnaean Society in 1788 after his grand tour, during which he visited numerous notable botanists and their collections. His own collection, supplemented by Linnaeus', became a famous destination for European botanists in its own right. Simon Taylor (1742-1796) trained at The Society for the Encouragement of Arts, Manufactures and Commerce and his style as a botanical artist was similar to Ehret's. He had a number of significant patrons throughout his successful career, including Margaret Cavendish Harley, Duchess of Portland, John Fothergill, John Ellis and Ralph Willett of Merly, as well as John Stuart, Earl of Bute (1713-1792). Bute was a prolific naturalist who played a vital role in the foundation of Kew Gardens, hence his interest in this extensive record of the plants grown there. His botanical interests led to his friend George III appointing him Ranger

of Richmond Park, and he published *Botanical Tables* Containing the Families of British Plants in 1785.

This work was originally part of a set of fifteen volumes, comprising 684 drawings on vellum, of the plants at Kew, uniformly bound in red morocco gilt with the arms of the Earl of Bute. The provenance of these volumes can be traced to the May 1794 Leigh and Sotheby auction of Lord Bute's botanical library. A portion of this collection of drawings by Taylor now reside in the collection at Kew Gardens, and further drawings are in the collection of the Natural History Museum and in the Lindley Library of the Royal Horticultural Society.



Palestine. He was an early clerical supporter of Darwinism, attempting to reconcile the theory with Christianity, but rejected it later in his career. This fine first edition of his *Survey of Western Palestine* has been described as "an account of the natural products of Palestine, based chiefly on the author's own observations and collections secured during four visits to the country. In the section on birds 348 species are enumerated, with the addition of brief notes on their occurrence and geographical distribution" (Anker).

Both Nissen and Stafleu call for 258 plates, whereas this copy has 257.

Beginning professional life as a banker when he inherited his father's bank in 1796, Dawson Turner (1775-1858) was an amateur follower of botany, aided by his professional relationship with James Sowerby. He authored numerous works on botany; his *Fuci sive plantarum Fucorum generi* is one of his rare publications.





A collection of watercolour drawings by the entomologist, botanist, natural history illustrator and author Antoine-Charles Vauthier (1790-1879), originally produced for Marie-Caroline de Bourbon-Sicile, duchesse de Berry (1798-1870). Born an Italian princess of the House of Bourbon, the duchesse de Berry married into the French royal family and eventually became a notable champion of the arts. She was an avid theatre-goer, amassed a sizeable collection of paintings, and leading artists of the day including Pierre-Joseph Redouté (see lots 447, 448, 449,

and 450) counted her as a patroness. She was also the mother of Henri, comte du Chambord.

A note on a loose sheet of paper records that the plates "3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13" (plate 14 perhaps omitted from this list in error) were "rec[eived] from Mr. Payne | May 1847", suggesting that plates 1 and 2 were already separated from the rest of the collection in the mid nineteenth century. Another handwritten note on the same sheet, in the hand of William Kelly, elaborates on the rich provenance of these beautiful drawings:

"These paintings were executed by Vauthier, for the celebrated Duchess[e] de Berré. They were given to me by the late Mr James Pickering Ord, with some historical papers of his ancestor Sir Gilbert Pickering".

12). The slip also says that "on or after the 20th July each Subscriber, by producing this acknowledgement, will be entitled to the Frontispiece for the Studies from Nature". The presence of the slip in the part, and the absence of a frontispiece, seems to indicate that the first owner of this work did not take up this offer.

Henriette Antoinette Vincent née Rideau du Sal (1786-1834) married Ambrose Vincent who became superintendent of the Empress Josephine's garden at Malmaison and later at Compiegne. She was a student of both van Spaendonck and Redoute, and exhibited frequently at the Paris Salon.

Willmott (1858-1934) was a noted horticulturalist, serving as a influential member of the Royal Horticultural Society, one of the first 2 women to be admitted into the Linnaean Society, and was the first recipient of the Victoria Medal

of Honour for British horticulturists in 1897. She was said to have cultivated over 100,000 plants in her garden, and served as a sponsor for botanical expeditions as far ranging as China and the Middle East. At one time employing no less than eighty-five gardeners at her home Warley Place, Essex: more than 60 plants have been named after her home or herself. She was invovled in manifold professional horticultural projects throughout her life, and published two books, *Warley Garden in Spring* and *The Genus Rosa*, which at its inital publication only sold 260 copies, leaving her with debt that plagued her until her death.

His interest in botany existed alongside his medical career: he became a member of the Linnaean Society in 1791. *Medical Botany* is his most prominent work, an investigation of *materia medica* based on research by his fellow members of the Royal Society of Physicians, examining the plants' botanical characteristics alongside their medicinal uses. He was recorded as having died, in 1805, of smallpox; his library was sold at Sotheby's later that year.
